


Jimmy's Bay



All craft must move in an anti-clockwise direction

Keelboat Moorings
Max speed 10 km/h
between yachts

All skiing in anti-clockwise direction.

The ski lane in Jimmy's Bay is to be kept clear for boats towing skiers only. All other water users wishing to cross this lane must ensure that no water skiers are approaching before proceeding.

- Green bouys to starboard (Right hand Side)
- × Red bouys to port (Left hand Side)

Swimmers must swim only in the demarcated swimming areas.

Jet Ski's only to park and depart from Jimmy's Bay Beach. IT IS A NO PLAY ZONED AREA

THEEWATERSKLOOF DAM General Boating Rules and Regulations

1. The Theewater Sports Club reserves the right to either refuse permission to launch, or to order the immediate removal from the water, any craft that is not piloted by any person in possession of a Skippers licence as well as not being in possession of a valid Certificate Fitness for the said craft. Furthermore, if it is considered to be unsafe or being used in a manner endangering the safety of other users of the dam, to order the immediate removal of the craft from the water.
2. No person shall be in control of any craft while under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
3. Certain areas of the dam are restricted or have speed limits imposed. Please refer to the maps in this booklet for details. Take note of the **NO WAKE ZONE** on the public side and keep well clear of **SWIMMERS** and **FISHING TACKLE**
4. The 'top' section of the dam, northwest of the Draaiberg Bridge is restricted to permit holders only. Anyone interested in obtaining a permit can contact the TSC Manager for information.
5. No craft may enter the area between the dam wall and the row of yellow marker bouys.
6. All power boats, whether towing skiers or not, shall give way to sailing craft, canoes, rowing boats, paddle ski's, swimmers, etc.
7. Any infringements should be reported to the TSC Manager or the Safety Officer. Please respect the safety and privacy of fellow water-users, give due consideration to others regarding noise disturbance and conduct yourself in such a way so as not to create a nuisance or danger to others.
8. The skipper of each craft must ensure that there are sufficient SABS / SAMSA -approved life jackets for all persons on board. It is strongly recommended that the life jacket be worn at all times.
9. The following persons must wear life jackets at all times:
 - a) All non-swimmers and persons under the age of 16;
 - b) Water-skiers;
 - c) Windsurfers, kite boarders, sailboarders, and para-sailors;
 - d) Canoeists
 - e) Persons in inflatable craft without inboard seating;
 - f) Multihull and dinghy sailors;
 - g) PWC-users
 - h) All persons when rough water conditions exist.
 - i) At any time the skipper may require it.
10. Wetsuits are **not** considered life jackets.
11. The PWC 'play zone' is restricted to PWC only.



Restricted Area with special rules -see Map 2





 Alternative water-skiing spots. Please note that you may only go ashore in the event of an emergency.

WARNING: The weather on the dam can change very quickly. Be prepared for strong winds and return to the Club if in any doubt. Always ensure that someone knows where you intended going and what time you will return. At certain times of the year, the level of the Dam can drop to low levels. During these periods, hazards or obstacles must be avoided. This might happen e.g. at the end of the summer season or in drought conditions. Be extremely careful to establish from the Club officials where obstacles or hazards might be. Take note also of cardinal buoys which indicate the deepest water.



Cardinal buoys indicate that the deepest water occurs at the side of the mark's name. They are placed to the north, south, east and west from the hazard. The cardinal buoys have mainly the shape of columns or poles. They are painted in horizontal, yellow and black stripes, and their top marks (two cones) are painted in black. The arrangement of the cones at the top is an indication of the black stripe (or stripes) position on the buoy.
